CALL TO ORDER: A regular meeting was held at the Kentucky Board of Pharmacy at the Board Office at 125 Holmes Street, State Office Building Annex, Ste. 300, Frankfort, Kentucky. President Hanna called the Meeting to order at 9:03 a.m.

Members present: Cathy Hanna, Brian DeWire, Scott Greenwell, Larry Hadley and Joel Thornbury. Staff: Michael Burlison, Executive Director; Steve Hart, Pharmacy Inspections and Investigations Coordinator; Shannon Allen, Christina Amburgey, Katie Busroe, Amanda Harding, and Phil Losch, Pharmacy and Drug Inspectors; Cheryl Lalonde, Assistant Attorney General and Board Counsel; Brian Fingerson, Pharmacist Recovery Network Committee; and Lisa Atha, Executive Secretary. Guests: Chris Killmeier and Morgan Coffey, Walgreens; Jennifer Miracle, Walmart; Ralph Bouvette, Brittany Helton and Mark Huffmyer, APSC; Anne Policastri, KSHP; Robert McFalls, KPhA; Jan Gould, Kentucky Retail Federation; Rich Palumbo, Express Scripts; Verlon Pierce; Minhkhoy Nguyen, Ngoc Minh Ho, and Amber Cann, Sullivan University College of Pharmacy; and Laurel Taylor, Laura Kroon, and Adam Wright, University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy. Board Member Deborah Brewer was not present. Melanie Curtis, Court Reporter, recorded the meeting.

MINUTES: On motion by Dr. DeWire, seconded by Mr. Thornbury and passed unanimously, the Minutes of March 12, 2014, were approved.

APPEARANCES:

William Hamilton. Mr. Hamilton was sworn-in by Melody Curtis, Court Reporter. Mr. Hamilton was appearing before the Board because of a violation of his Agreed Order. Mr. Hamilton's Kentucky pharmacist's license was suspended on March 5, 2003, due to an inability to practice with care, skill and competence to patients by submitting false claims to insurance providers. On November 29, 2010, Mr. Hamilton's Kentucky pharmacist's license was reinstated with restrictions. One of the restrictions was Mr. Hamilton shall keep the Board advised at all times of his places of employment and shall only practice at a location and a work schedule that has received prior approval of the Board or its President. Mr. Hamilton is on the OIG Exclusion List. He had been employed by Fort Campbell Military base pharmacy. On or about June 14, 2014, he applied for a job with Kindred Hospital. After discussion among Kindred Hospital employees, it was determined Mr. Hamilton could be hired. He trained on June 21, 2014. On June 23, 2014, he emailed Pharmacy and Drug Inspector Phil Losch informing him of his new position. Within a few days, Kindred Hospital determined he was not hireable but did pay him for the one day he trained. A case was opened for violation of an Agreed Order. Mr. Hamilton did indicate on his application to Kindred Hospital that his Kentucky pharmacist's license was in good standing.

Mr. Hadley moved to issue William Hamilton a Letter of Reprimand. Dr. Greenwell seconded, but a vote was not immediately taken.

Dr. Greenwell moved to go into Executive Session pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(c)(j) to discuss proposed or pending litigation and individual adjudications with Ms. Lalonde, Mr. Burluson, Mr. Hart and Mr. Losch in attendance. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Dr. De Wire moved to come out of Executive Session. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Hadley's original motion, seconded by Dr. Greenwell, to issue William Hamilton a Letter of Reprimand was unanimously defeated.

Mr. Thornbury moved to suspend William Hamilton's Kentucky pharmacist's license for one year, add an additional 4 years of probation to his existing Agreed Order of Reinstatement, and levy a \$500 fine. Dr. Greenwell seconded, and the motion passed 3 to 1, with Dr. Greenwell, Mr. Hadley and Mr. Thornbury voting for the motion and Dr. DeWire voting against the motion.

Verlon Pierce. Mr. Pierce was sworn-in by Melody Curtis, Court Reporter. Mr. Pierce was appearing before the Board to request reinstatement of his Kentucky pharmacist's license. In June 2008, Mr. Pierce plead guilty to selling professional drug samples. On April 4, 2009, Mr. Pierce voluntarily surrendered his Kentucky pharmacist's license and was sentenced to 20 months probation. His probation was completed in October 2009. Mr. Pierce is on the OIG Exclusion List. On November 5, 2011, Mr. Pierce entered into an Agreed Order of Revocation with the Board.

Mr. Thornbury moved to go into Executive Session pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(c)(j) to discuss proposed or pending litigation and individual adjudications with Ms. Lalonde, Mr. Burluson, and Mr. Losch in attendance. Dr. Greenwell seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Dr. Greenwell moved to come out of Executive Session. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Thornbury moved to deny Verlon Pierce's request for reinstatement of his Kentucky pharmacist's license and Mr. Pierce may not reappear to request reinstatement of his Kentucky pharmacist's license until Mr. Pierce is off the OIG Exclusion list in 2022. Dr. Greenwell seconded, and the motion passed 3 to 1 with Dr. Greenwell, Mr. Hadley and Mr. Thornbury voting for the motion and Dr. DeWire voting against the motion.

Mr. Pierce asked the Board to reconsider the vote, but the vote stands.

INTERAGENCY: Mr. Burluson gave a brief update regarding Drug Enforcement and Professional Practices proceeding with the scheduling of butalbital.

BOARD REPORTS:

Board Executive Director. 1) Emars reports for May 2014 and June 2014 were presented to the Board. The state took \$100,000 from the Board's fund and will take an additional \$100,000 in 2015 and 2016. 2) Mr. Thornbury moved to approve travel at no expense to the Board for Executive Director Mike Burselson to attend the NABP Stakeholders Meeting July 29, 2014. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed unanimously. 3) Mr. Thornbury moved to approve travel for Mr. Burselson to attend the NABP MPJE Item Review September 3-5, 2014. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed unanimously. 4) Mr. Thornbury moved to approve 3 Board Members and 3 staff to attend MALTAGON October 26-29, 2014, at St. Petersburg, Florida. Dr. Greenwell seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

CASE REVIEW SUMMARY:

Mr. Thornbury moved to accept Case Review Committee recommendations as written except for Case No. 14-0250 A, B and C. Case No. 14-0250 A, B and C will be investigated further. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Case No. 14-0013A. REVISIT. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unethical or unprofessional conduct by allowing pharmacist to circulate misleading statements concerning the practice of pharmacy. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0013B. REVISIT. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unethical or unprofessional conduct by circulating misleading statements concerning the practice of pharmacy. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0061A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded product as the result of a medication error. Patient allegedly received Tazorac cream instead of the prescribed triamcinolone cream. Alleged violation of law: KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0061B. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received Tazorac cream instead of the prescribed triamcinolone cream. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to

proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0061C. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received Tazorac cream instead of the prescribed triamcinolone cream. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0066A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded product as the result of a medication error. Patient allegedly received quetiapine 100mg instead of the prescribed galantamine ER 8mg. Alleged violation of law: KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0066B. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. The patient was allegedly dispensed quetiapine 100mg instead of the prescribed galantamine ER 8mg. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0068A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by allowing a medication to be dispensed to the wrong patient. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0068B. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by dispensing medication to the wrong patient and divulging to unauthorized persons patient information without the patient's express consent or without order or direction of the court and by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(2)(b) and (d). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0068C. Pharmacy technician allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by dispensing medication to the wrong patient and divulging to unauthorized persons patient information without the patient's express consent or without order or direction of the court and by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0073A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by allowing controlled substance medications to be lost from the pharmacy. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0073B. Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by not ensuring adequate security and control of medications. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:205(2)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0073C. Pharmacy technician allegedly engaged in unethical or unprofessional behavior by diverting controlled substance from place of employment. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0243A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded product as the result of a medication error. Patient allegedly received tobramycin ophthalmic solution instead of the prescribed Tobradex. Alleged violation of law: KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0243B. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received tobramycin ophthalmic solution instead of the prescribed Tobradex. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0243C. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received tobramycin ophthalmic solution instead of the prescribed Tobradex. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0244A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded product as the result of a medication error. Patient allegedly received Cymbalta instead of Dexilant that was prescribed. Alleged violation of law: KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0244B. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received Cymbalta instead of Dexilant that was prescribed. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0245A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded product as the result of a medication error. Patient allegedly received 38 zolpidem 10mg tablets when the prescription was labeled 45 tablets. Alleged violation of law: KRS 217.065(2)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0245B. Pharmacist allegedly committed a medication error. Patient allegedly received 38 zolpidem 10mg tablets when the prescription was labeled 45 tablets. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0246A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by allowing the incorrect medication to be dispensed to a patient. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0246B. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public by dispensing the wrong medication to a patient. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0247A. Pharmacy permit holder failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:100 Section 1. CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0247B. Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:205 (3)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0247C. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by diverting controlled substances. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0248A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in or aided and abetted the unlawful distribution of legend distribution of legend medications. Alleged violation of law: KRS. 315.121(1)(j). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0248B. Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly failed in his responsibility of procurement, storage, security, and disposition of drugs. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:205 Section 2(3)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0248C. Pharmacist allegedly stole approximately 1700 tablets of various strengths of hydrocodone/APAP and approximately 600 tablets of various strengths of alprazolam. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0249. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a prescription for lorazepam to patient without actually dispensing the medication to the patient. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: Case is dismissed.

Case No. 14-0250A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold misbranded products as the result of medication errors. Alleged violations of law: KRS 216.065(1) and KRS 315.121(a). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence developed and the investigator is directed to conduct further investigation.

Case No. 14-0250B. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by committing medication errors. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d) and 201 KAR 2:205. CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence developed and the investigator is directed to conduct further investigation.

Case No. 14-0250C. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by committing medication errors. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence developed and the investigator is directed to conduct further investigation.

Case No. 14-0251A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a prescription for a controlled substance written by a prescriber without DEA registration and submitted incorrect prescriber information to the Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) site. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a) and 201 KAR 2:170 section I(6). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0251B. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by dispensing a prescription for a controlled substance written by a prescriber without a DEA registration. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0251C. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by dispensing data submitted to KASPER to include a prescriber who did not authorize a prescription. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f) and (d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

Case No. 14-0252A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by allowing a patient to receive a misbranded product. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(1)(a) and KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0252B. Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional and unethical conduct by dispensing a misbranded product and allegedly engaged in conduct likely to deceive, defraud or harm the public. Alleged violations of law: KRS 315.121(2)(d) and KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0253A. Pharmacy permit holder allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of medications. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:100 Section 1. CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0253B. Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of medications. Alleged violation of law: 201 KAR 2:205 (3)(b). CRC

Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

Case No. 14-0253C. Pharmacy technician allegedly engaged in unethical or unprofessional conduct by diverting controlled substances from place of employment. Alleged violation of law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

RECIPROCITY/RELICENSURE/INTERNSHIP/PHARMACY TECHNICIANS:

Pharmacy Technician Registrant AY. Dr. Greenwell moved to approve the application for pharmacy technician registration for AY provided he signs an Agreed Order with probation for one year. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Pharmacy Technician Registrant PK. Dr. Greenwell moved to deny the application for pharmacy technician registration for PK. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

CORRESPONDENCE/COMMUNICATION:

Expedien Rx Pharmacy/Trenia Yielding. Trenia Yielding requested to be dual pharmacist-in-charge of Expedien Rx Pharmacy and Rx Plus Pharmacy both located in the same building in Sanford, Florida. Expedien Rx Pharmacy will offer mail order services to the patients in the Manchester, Kentucky, hospital. Mr. Thornbury moved to table Trenia Yielding's request to be dual pharmacist-in-charge of Expedien Rx Pharmacy and Rx Plus Pharmacy until more information can be obtained. Dr. DeWire seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Baptist Health LaGrange Kresge Pharmacy. Noble Clarke, Pharmacy Supervisor, requested a waiver for Baptist Health LaGrange Kresge Pharmacy for compounding equipment required per 201 KAR 2:090(2)(1). The pharmacy performs no compounding. The pharmacy does have refrigeration units. Dr. Greenwell moved to approve Baptist Health LaGrange Kresge Pharmacy's request for a waiver from the equipment required per 201 KAR 2:090(2)(1) with the exception of a refrigeration unit, but if the practice changes the waiver will be reconsidered. Dr. DeWire seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Medvantx Specialty Pharmacy. Sean Harms, pharmacist-in-charge of Medvantx Specialty Pharmacy, requested a waiver for Medvantx Specialty Pharmacy for compounding equipment required per 201 KAR 2:090(2)(1). The pharmacy performs no compounding. Dr. Greenwell moved to approve Medvantx Specialty Pharmacy's request for a waiver from the equipment required per 201 KAR 2:090(2)(1) with the exception of the refrigeration unit, but if the practice changes the waiver will be reconsidered. Dr. De Wire seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

LEGISLATIVE/REGULATION:

201 KAR 2:030, License transfer. Clarification from the May 14, 2014 Board Meeting motion regarding changing 201 KAR 2:030 was discussed. Mr. Thornbury moved to change 201 KAR 2:030, Section 2(2) to state, "applicant holds in good standing an active license to practice pharmacy" and file the proposed change by July 15, 2014, with a hearing date of August 28, 2014, at 9 a.m. at the Board office. Dr. DeWire seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

201 KAR 2:040, Registration of pharmacist interns. Dr. Greenwell moved to change 201 KAR 2:040, Section 4(4) to state, "Notify the Board of Pharmacy within 30 days of any charge of a felony, a violation of drug laws, or a violation of alcohol laws" and file the proposed change by July 15, 2014, with a hearing date of August 28, 2014, at 10 a.m. at the Board office. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

CONTINUING EDUCATION:

Dr. Greenwell moved to approve continuing education programs 14-11 through 14-23 as recommended. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS:

KPhA/KSHP Grant Proposal. Pharmacist intern and University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy student Laurel Taylor presented the programs developed for middle school age students, parents, and community to help educate and prevent drug abuse. Input was gathered from the Office of Drug Control Policy, the Board of Pharmacy, KSHP, KPhA, University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy and Sullivan University College of Pharmacy. Anne Policastri, KSHP, informed the Board every 6 months a report will be made to the Board regarding budget and details of programs presented. No more than 8% of the grant will be used for administrative costs. Mr. Thornbury moved to approve the budget and continuation of the programs for the education and prevention of drug abuse as presented. Dr. Greenwell seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Pharmacist Supervision. Mr. Thornbury moved to direct the Assistant Attorney General and Board Counsel to prepare a written analysis of what type of technician supervision and final verification is required taking into account the statutes and regulation. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Final Verification. There was discussion regarding the presentation by Kosair Children's Hospital Pharmacy and the use of the Dose Edge technology in regards to a pharmacist providing a final physical verification of a compounded sterile product. Mr. Thornbury moved to request Brian Yarberry of Kosair Children's Hospital Pharmacy to appear at the September 2014 Board Meeting to discuss the final physical verification of a compounded sterile product. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed 3 to 1 with Dr. DeWire, Mr. Hadley and Mr. Thornbury voting for the motion and Dr. Greenwell voting against the motion.

NEW BUSINESS:

Attorney for the Board. Mr. Thornbury moved for Executive Director Burlison to proceed with the process of employing a full time, in-house attorney for the Board and if the position is approved, present at the September Board Meeting. Mr. Hadley seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Burlison gave a brief overview of the most recent information available from the FDA regarding outsourcing facilities. There are a lot of unanswered questions FDA must clarify. The Memorandum of Understanding between FDA and the states has not yet been presented to the states. Mr. Thornbury moved for Executive Director Burlison to start the process of changing the language in the Kentucky Pharmacy Practice Act to solve the issues and bring to the September Board Meeting. Dr. DeWire seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

USP Chapter 800. Pharmacy and Drug Inspector Phil Losch gave a brief overview of the proposed USP Chapter 800. Dr. Greenwell moved for Phil Losch, Mike Burlison and President Hanna to collectively submit comments to USP regarding proposed Chapter 800. Mr. Thornbury seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

FYI: Two cases were expunged.

ADJOURNMENT: On motion by DeWire, seconded by Dr. Greenwell and passed unanimously, President Hanna adjourned the Board Meeting at 12:45 p.m. The next regularly scheduled Board Meeting is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m. on September 10, 2014, at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy, Lexington, Kentucky.
