**September 9, 2015**

**CALL TO ORDER:** A regular meeting was held at the Kentucky Board of Pharmacy at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy, 789 South Limestone in Lexington, Kentucky. Vice President Hadley called the Meeting to order at 9:10 a.m.

Members present: Deborah Brewer, Brian DeWire, Scott Greenwell, Larry Hadley and Cathy Hanna. Staff: Steve Hart, Executive Director; Shannon Allen, Christina Amburgey, Caleb Benningfield, Katie Busroe, and Amanda Harding, Pharmacy and Drug Inspectors; Cheryl Lalonde, Assistant Attorney General and Board Counsel; and Lisa Atha, Executive Secretary. Guests: Anne Policastri, KSHP; Robert McFalls and Chris Clifton, KPhA; Jan Gould, Kentucky Retail Federation; Brittany Reid, Walmart; Laurel Taylor, Community Pharmacy Resident; and University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy PY3 students. Susan Elsensohn, Court Reporter, recorded the meeting. Board President Joel Thornbury and Pharmacist Recovery Network Chair Brian Fingerson were not present.

**MINUTES:** On motion by Dr. Greenwell, seconded by Dr. Hanna and passed unanimously, the Minutes of July 8, 2015 were approved.

**APPEARANCES:**

**David Powers.** Dr. Powers was sworn-in by Susan Elsensohn, Court Reporter. Dr. Powers was appearing before the Board to request reinstatement of his Kentucky pharmacist's license. Dr. Powers gave a brief overview of the events that led to the loss of his pharmacist's license. He was licensed as a pharmacist in Kentucky in 2001. In November 2010, Dr. Powers began self medicating with benzodiazepines and hydrocodone combination products. From January 27 to February 7, 2011, he was admitted to Pikeville Medical Hospital and eventually transferred to University of Kentucky Medical Center due to complications resulting from the abuse of drugs. On June 11, 2013, the Board of Pharmacy inspector conducted an audit at the pharmacy owned by Dr. Powers and on August 16, 2013, interviewed him regarding significant losses of controlled substances. Dr. Powers denied an impairment issue and thought the situation was settled. On August 29, 2013, Dr. Powers self reported to Brian Fingerson, Chair of Kentucky Pharmacist Recovery Network. September 7 to 10, 2013, he was admitted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center with a diagnosis of withdrawal symptoms. September 15, 2013, is Dr. Powers' sobriety date and when he entered an inpatient treatment center. On November 18, 2013, he returned to work at the pharmacy he owned. On June 30, 2014, Dr. Powers received an Agreed Order of Suspension which he signed July 14, 2014.

After discussion, Dr. Greenwell moved to go into Executive Session pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(c)(j) to discuss proposed or pending litigation and individual adjudications with Ms.

Lalone, Mr. Hart and Ms. Allen in attendance. Dr. Hanna seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Dr. Greenwell moved to come out of Executive Session. Ms. Brewer seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Dr. Greenwell moved to reinstate David Powers' Kentucky pharmacist's license with stipulations as follows: 10 years probation if Dr. Powers maintains ownership of pharmacy, if ownership is not maintained 5 years probation; ownership of pharmacy may not be transferred to a family member; shall maintain a perpetual inventory at all places of employment for Schedule II drugs, with electronic tracking of Schedule III-V drugs and expired controlled substances, perpetual inventory shall be made available to the Board upon request and audits may be conducted; shall attend AA/NA meetings no less than 6 times per 2 week period or 12 meetings per calendar month, which shall include a minimum of 2 meetings per week; must continue monthly, or more frequently if deemed necessary, treatment with a CAD/C for a year with quarterly updates provided to the Board; Board shall conduct quarterly inspections at all locations of employment or practice as a pharmacist for the first two years of probation, then semi-annually for the next 3 years, the cost of which not to exceed \$500 per inspection, shall be paid to the Board within 30 days of invoicing; continuing education requirements must be satisfied, renewal fees and any penalties must be paid, and a complete renewal application must be submitted; maximum hours of work: 45 hours/week or 90 hours/2 weeks, with a maximum of 50 hours in any 7 consecutive days and no overtime; shall provide a copy of this Agreed Order to all employers and pharmacists-in-charge and pharmacist-in-charge of his pharmacy should he retain ownership; shall sign an aftercare contract, to include drug counselor if indicated, with the Pharmacist Recovery Network Committee (PRNC) for the length of the Agreed Order; any violation of this Agreed Order or PRN contract shall be reported to the Board and PRNC Chair within 24 hours of violation; shall notify Board of change of home address, telephone number, and/or email within 7 days of change; shall provide to the Board and PRNC a signed release granting the Board and PRNC access to all written medical records and conversations regarding medical care; shall provide the Board and PRNC with written monthly reports of all AA/NA meetings; shall agree to provide observed urine, other body fluid, or hair samples for drug/alcohol screens at the direction of PRNC, the Board or any other monitoring body; provide copies of any results of any screens ordered to the Board and PRNC; provide notification to PRNC Chair, Board and testing company of anything that may affect pharmacist's availability for screens prior to event, a missed screen shall be cause for reporting such to the Board, any positive screen that is a violation of the Agreed Order or PRN contract shall be communicated to the Board by the PRNC Chair within 24 hours, a report indicating a presumptive presence shall constitute a conclusive basis, without the necessity of a hearing, for a determination that pharmacist is not in compliance with the terms of this Agreed Order of Reinstatement; shall agree to abstain from any and all mood-altering chemicals, except as prescribed by pharmacist's physician and only after consultation with PRNC Chair; shall notify PRNC Chair in advance if any mood-altering and/or potentially addictive medications are required or recommended by pharmacist's physician; shall provide documentation to PRNC Chair of the need for the medication within 3 days; shall renew verification with PRNC Chair every 90 days if need for medication is ongoing; shall give up the right to self-medicate with the exception of single entity OTC NSAIDS and acetaminophen; shall be excluded from accepting a position of pharmacist-in-charge, power of attorney, or preceptor;

shall advise Board at all times of place of employment and shall only practice at a location with a work schedule that has received prior approval of the Board or its President; shall obtain all prescriptions and those of family at a pharmacy designated in writing to the Board; prescriptions shall not be filled by a family member or at any family owned pharmacy and shall not dispense any drugs for self or family; shall attend within 1 year of entry of this Agreed Order either the University of Utah School on Alcoholism and other Drug Dependencies, CAPTASA, or SE PRN meeting and shall provide a certificate of completion; shall provide monthly written self performance evaluations to the Board and PRNC Chair and shall make all appearances before the PRNC as requested, including an annual appearance 3 closest to the anniversary date of reinstatement; shall not work at a pharmacy owned, in whole or in part, by him or another member of his family and shall not possess a key to a pharmacy owned, in whole or in part, by him or another member of his family; shall not be on the premises of any pharmacy owned, in whole or in part, by him or another member of his family; during probation shall not acquire another pharmacy; committing any act that results in violation of federal or state pharmacy or drug statute or regulation, may result in an emergency suspension of pharmacist's license, require an appearance before the Board, or result in a complaint against pharmacist's license with the Board imposing any applicable penalties; any violation of the Agreed Order of Reinstatement shall cause him to automatically lose his license to practice pharmacy for not less than five years and one day and shall require individual to petition the Board for reinstatement only after he has taken and successfully passed the entire Kentucky Board of Pharmacy licensure examination; and shall not seek to amend or modify this Agreed Order. Above information shall be reported to NABP and is subject to disclosure under the Kentucky Open Records Act. Dr. Hanna seconded, and the motion passed 3 to 1 with Dr. Greenwell, Ms. Brewer and Dr. Hanna voting for the motion and Dr. DeWire voting against the motion.

**INTERAGENCY: Drug Education Grant.** Anne Policastri, KSHP, Bob McFalls and Chris Clifton, KPhA, and Laurel Taylor, Community Pharmacy Resident with APSC presented an update on the Drug Education Grant. The goal of the program is to help pharmacists, students and technicians provide community outreach regarding substance abuse. A tool kit has been developed for middle school age children, parents and community presentations. One 3 hour training session has been conducted at the APSC Annual Meeting with 13 attendees. Since every county is affected by substance abuse, the next step is to develop a statewide outreach with many, many trainers. KSHP will be providing training in May at the Annual Meeting and KPhA will be providing training in June at the Annual Meeting. Within the next year, an effort will be made to role the program out to as many people as possible. The grant was for \$30,000 and so far the only expenditure has been for the initial flash drives. The group thanked Dr. Hanna for being the liaison to the Board.

The KPhA Legislative Conference is November 13-14, 2015, at the Hyatt in Lexington, Kentucky.

Beginning balance was \$240,284.49, with \$21,233.09 spent on training and education and \$30,000 spent the Drug Education Grant, leaving a balance of \$189,051.40. 4) Ms. Brewer moved to allow Executive Director Hart to attend the Executive Officers Forum at NABP on October 13-14, 2015, at no expense to the Board. **Case No. 14-0458 Revisit.** Wholesaler falsified original application in October 2013 by answering, “no” to the question concerning convictions by a partner, officer or employee of the company of any controlled drug laws. **New Information:** Letter stating all ownership is now transferred. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(1)(e). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0060A Revisit.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 359 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 7.5/325mg and 1884 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 10/325mg over a period of approximately 2 years. Total amount missing of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 7.5/325mg is 299 tablets over a period of 3 months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:100 Section 1. CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0060D Revisit.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 359 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 7.5/325mg and 1884 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 10/325mg over a period of approximately 2 years. Total amount missing of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 7.5/325mg is 299 tablets over a period of 3 months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:205 Section 2(3)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0252A.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 2600 dosage units over a period of nine months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:100 Section 1. CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0252B.** Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 2600 dosage units over a period of nine months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:205 Section 2(3)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0252C.** Registered Pharmacy Technician allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by selling, transferring, dispensing, ingesting, or administering a drug for which a prescription drug order is required, without first receiving a prescription drug order for the drug. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(2)(f). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0255A.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 11,320 dosage units over a period of 20 months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:100 Section 1. CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0255B.** Pharmacist-in-charge allegedly failed to provide adequate security and control of drugs. Pharmacy reported a loss of 11, 320 dosage unites over a period of 20 months. Alleged Violation of Law: 201 KAR 2:205 Section 2(3)(b). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0259A.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly uses a computer system that does not record the identifying designation of the dispensing pharmacist for the original filling and each refill. Also, the pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct. The physician prescribed Opana Er 40mg to take 1 tablet two times a day #60. The patient was dispensed Opana ER 40mg to take 1 tablet three times a day #90. Another time the physician prescribed Opana 20mg to take 1 tablet two times a day #60. The patient was dispensed Opana ER 40mg to take 1 tablet twice a day #60. Alleged Violations of Law: 201 KAR 2:170 Section 1(1)(h) and KRS 315.121 (1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0259B.** Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public with or without established proof of actual injury by committing a medication error. Pharmacist allegedly filled a prescription for Opana ER 40mg to take 1 tablet three times a day for a quantity of 90. The doctor prescribed Opana ER 40mg to take 1 tablet two times a day for a quantity of 60. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0259C.** Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public with or without established proof of actual injury by committing a medication error. Pharmacist allegedly filled a prescription for Opana ER 40mg to take 1 tablet twice a day with a quantity of #60. The doctor prescribed Opana 20mg to take 1 tablet two times a day with a quantity of #60. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121 (2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0260A.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly sold a misbranded drug due to a dispensing error. Patient allegedly received 140 tablets of oxycodone/acetaminophen instead of the labeled 150 tablets. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 217.065(1). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0260B.** Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public with or without established proof of actual injury by committing a dispensing error. Patient allegedly received 140 tablets of oxycodone/acetaminophen instead of the labeled 150 tablets. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0281.** Registered Technician allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by diverting approximately \$22,612.91 from the pharmacy. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(a). CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing. CRC Recommendation: There is sufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the Executive Director is directed to attempt resolution through an Agreed Order and/or, if unsuccessful, to proceed with either an Administrative Conference, if requested, or the issuance of a Formal Complaint and Notice of Hearing.

**Case No. 15-0287A.** Pharmacy permit holder allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct. Patient was allegedly not dispensed an emergency 72 hour refill. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(1)(a). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Case No. 15-0287B.** Pharmacist allegedly engaged in unprofessional or unethical conduct by engaging in conduct likely to harm the public with or without established proof of actual injury by not dispensing an emergency 72 hour refill. Alleged Violation of Law: KRS 315.121(2)(d). CRC Recommendation: There is insufficient evidence of a violation to warrant disciplinary action and the case is closed without prejudice.

**Vidisha Alwani, Reinstatement Request.** Vidisha Alwani requested to have her Kentucky pharmacist's license reinstated. Ms. Alwani was a Kentucky licensed pharmacist from 2008 until 2009. In March 2009, she moved to India and let her Kentucky pharmacist's license lapse. She has not practiced pharmacy since March 2009. She requested a waiver of internship hours and penalty fees. Dr. Greenwell moved to reinstate Vidisha Alwani's Kentucky pharmacist's license provided she pay all renewal fees and penalties, successfully complete the MPJE and NAPLEX, and complete 1000 intern hours. Dr. Hanna seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Dr. Johnson will spend 16 to 24 hours per week at each location. Dr. Hanna moved to deny Gary Johnson's request to be pharmacist-in-charge of University of Kentucky Healthcare Department of Pharmacy and St. Claire Regional Medical Center Pharmacy.
